National Infant Immunization Week (NIIW) is a yearly observance held in April from April 22nd to April 29th, highlighting the importance of protecting children two years and younger from vaccine-preventable diseases. CDC and the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) recommend that children stay on track with their well-child appointments and routine vaccinations. On—time vaccination is critical to provide protection against life threatening diseases. Reasons to Follow CDC's Recommended Immunization Schedule

Most parents vaccinate their children according to CDC's recommended <u>immunization schedule</u>, protecting them from 14 potentially serious diseases before their second birthday. Vaccinating children on time protects them and anyone around them with a weakened immune system. Down below are some reasons to follow CDC's recommended immunization schedule:

- **Ideal timing:** The immunization schedule is carefully designed to provide protection at just the right time.
- **Prevent complications:** While children are born with some immunity, they have not yet built up the necessary defenses against the diseases that vaccines prevent. Delaying vaccines could leave your child vulnerable to disease when he/she is most likely to have serious complications.
- Early protection: It can take weeks for a vaccine to help your child make protective disease-fighting antibodies, and some vaccines require multiple doses to provide best protection. Its best to vaccinate before your child is exposed to dangerous diseases.
- **Best protection:** Children wont have the best protection from 14 serious diseases until they get all the recommended doses of each vaccine.
- **Spreading illness:** Not vaccinating your child on time can make someone else sick. Children who are not vaccinated on schedule are not only at risk of getting sick themselves, but they can also spread illness to <u>others who aren't protected</u>.
